Land acquisitions approve the Council of State Thus brought the state to with to 15 per cent of its proquota for the Cape Lookou tional Seashore.

At a meeting with Gov. Scott, the council approved acquisition of approximatel acres on Core Banks Portsmouth Island in Car County.

They also initiated demnation proceedings for acquisition of about 125 racres at the seashore site.

This leaves an estimated acres for North Carolina purchase in a total seas tract of about 17,000 acres is to be bought with sfunds.

The federal government purchase approximately 3 acres for the park Shackleford Banks.

A majority of the hold the state must still acquire owned by the Core Banks (Club (about 1,000 acres) Charles M. Reeves of Sanf (about 800 acres). This prope will probably have to be quired through condemnat proceedings according to Palcenhour of the State Department of Administration.

The Reeves property near cape Lookout and the Core the Banks Gun Club are the last sizeable land holdings which are still unacquired. Numerous small parcels remain to be

acquired also.

The Property Control Division I of the Department of Stadministration has now obtained approximately 90 per cent of the 20,000-plus acres needed for establishment of the national seashore on the Tar Heel coast. The state is obtaining Core Banks and Portsmouth Islam and will turn the property over to the National Park Service. The federal government is buying the third Outer Banks strip needed for the seashore—Shackleford Banks.

The project was authorized by former President Lyndon B Johnson in 1966 and land acquisitions by the State have been under way since then.

Slow Process

Purchase of the last remaining 3,000 acres has been a relatively slow process, and legal action by the state to condemn some of the land for public use is seen as a possibility.

The total amount of land sought during the windup negotiations has been variously reported as from 2,000 to 2,500 acres. The figure 3,000 is probably more accurate, meaning that Wednesday's 1,000 acre purchase brought the project one-third of the way to completion, Asst. Attv. Gen
